Nga mihi nui ki a koutou whānau, and a warm St Leo's blessing on you all

It has been a wonderful two weeks of school, despite the chilly mornings. I have been visiting classrooms frequently and it is great to see the tamariki happy and enjoying being at school. There is so much fun and amazing learning happening and I am so proud to share this with you in this week's newsletter.

Holy Week

Holy Week is a significant period in the Catholic faith that commemorates the final week of Jesus Christ's life on Earth, leading up to his crucifixion and resurrection. It begins with Palm Sunday, which celebrates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, where crowds greeted him with palm branches. It has been wonderful to see classes learning about this special time in Jesus's life and reflecting on how the people felt when Jesus entered Jerusalem.

Thursday marks the Last Supper, where Jesus shared the Passover meal with his disciples and instituted the sacrament of the Eucharist. Good Friday solemnly observes Jesus' crucifixion and death, reflecting on his sacrifice for humanity's sins. Holy Saturday is a day of quiet anticipation, symbolising the time between Jesus' death and resurrection. St Catherine reenacted the stations of the cross to the whole school today and this was a time where we revived the time in Jesus's life before he was crucified.

Finally, Easter Sunday celebrates Jesus' resurrection from the dead, signifying victory over sin and death, and is a joyful culmination of Holy Week. Throughout Holy Week, Catholics engage in special prayers, liturgies, and rituals to reflect on the profound events of Jesus' final days and to deepen their spiritual connection with God.



St Catherine News

On Monday, I was lucky to be working alongside the St Catherine tamariki. We painted crosses on canvas and reflected on Holy Week and remembered Jesus's entry into Jerusalem. The children enjoyed Garden to Table where we made potato chips in air fryers. We managed to source lots of potatoes from our school garden. We liked this to kitchen chemistry and discussed chemical reactions.









No School on Tuesday 2 April

The Tuesday following Easter Monday is a school holiday (but not a statutory holiday), meaning schools must not be open.

The terms and holidays are usually set so that Easter occurs during the first term break and the Easter Tuesday school holiday goes unnoticed. However, in some years Easter falls much earlier than usual such as in 1997, 2005, 2008, 2013, 2016, 2021 and 2024.

Whānau Games and Picnic

On Thursday 11 April the children will be taking part in some games organised by the Whānau Leaders. Tamariki can come to school dressed in the house colours: Koromiko - Blue, Kowhai -Yellow, Kauri - Green, Pohutukawa - Red. If you have pretty china teacups that we could use for the High tea please let me know as soon as possible if we can borrow them.




Cookbooks
